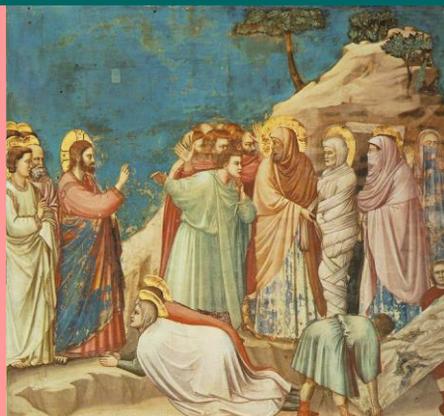


Worthing Deanery Prayer

Reflection

On Sunday the story in John's Gospel recounts when Jesus arrived in Bethany and his friend Lazarus had already been dead four days. Mary and Martha, his sisters, were broken-hearted. The people were wailing and lamenting in the face of death. No matter how clever or advanced humanity becomes we cannot change the condition of death. Even when our bodies are alive on earth the Bible tells us that we are spiritually at risk if we fail to remain in God's grace and love. We can feel absolutely helpless and hopeless when we are faced with death. The great question is "how can this situation be changed?" Jesus tells Martha the answer to this great question of life in verses 25 & 26. "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me though he may die, he shall live." Jesus is God, the great "I AM". What does that mean for our lives? It means that when we trust in Jesus, we will never have to die spiritually; we will have eternal life in relationship with Jesus forever. Our bodies may someday wear out but we will go on to be with the Lord forever. And one day our bodies will be resurrected and transformed into new bodies. Not only are we delivered from our sin when we come to Jesus but we are also delivered from death. We have the hope of the resurrection and we will soon celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus when Easter arrives in two weeks time.
